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### Abstract

The pursuit of sustainable economic growth and decent work, encapsulated by Sustainable Development Goal 8 (SDG 8), remains a pivotal challenge in contemporary management and policy, often complicated by the limitations of conventional business models. While modern business strategies emphasize efficiency, innovation, and competitiveness, they often overlook ethical governance, labour welfare, and long-term societal well-being. "Indian Knowledge Systems (IKS), particularly Kautilya's Arthashastra, offer a robust and distinct framework for economic management. Its emphasis on ethical leadership, inclusive growth, and welfare-oriented governance provides a compelling alternative perspective that warrants rigorous exploration for its contemporary applicability and potential to enrich current sustainable business models. Employing a conceptual and interdisciplinary approach, this study uniquely bridges ancient Indian economic thought, specifically Kautilya's Arthashastra, with contemporary sustainable business discourse by systematically aligning its core principles with SDG 8 targets and modern management constructs. This offers a culturally grounded alternative to conventional sustainability frameworks. A conceptual framework is proposed linking Arthashastra-inspired strategic principles with sustainable business outcomes. Among these, Kautilya's *Arthashastra* stands out as a seminal treatise on statecraft, economics, administration, and strategic management. Written around the 4th century BCE, the *Arthashastra* presents a

This paper aims to revisit the *Arthashastra* from a management perspective and align its economic and strategic principles with SDG 8. "To address this, the paper pursues three key objectives: (i) To identify and critically examine core Arthashastra principles pertinent to business strategy and economic management; (ii) To systematically map these identified principles to specific targets within SDG 8; and (iii) To propose a novel conceptual framework for integrating Arthashastra-inspired strategic principles into contemporary sustainable business practices."(Srinivasan & S, 2025)

Indian Knowledge Systems (IKS) are indigenous intellectual traditions evolved over millennia, including philosophical, economic, ethical, and governance frameworks. These systems are increasingly examined for their alignment with UN Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) to offer culturally rooted pathways for sustainable development. SDG 8 focuses on *inclusive and sustainable economic growth, full and productive employment, and decent work for all by 2030*.

## Literature Review

### Overview of Indian Knowledge Systems (IKS) and Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs)

Indian Knowledge Systems encompass a wide array of traditional knowledge, philosophies, and practices rooted in ancient Indian texts, including the Vedas, Upanishads, and classical treatises like the *Arthashastra*. Recent scholarship emphasizes the potential of IKS to contribute to sustainable development by integrating indigenous wisdom with modern developmental paradigms (e.g., sustainable resource use, ethical governance). SDG 8, which focuses on promoting sustained, inclusive economic growth, productive employment, and decent work for all, has been examined through the lens of IKS to explore culturally relevant and sustainable economic strategies. The *Arthashastra*, attributed to Kautilya (Chanakya), is a seminal treatise on statecraft, economic policy, and governance from ancient India. It offers detailed insights into economic management, labour relations, trade, taxation, and welfare policies. Scholars have analysed *Arthashastra*’s principles for their relevance to modern economic development, particularly in areas such as:

**Labor and Employment:** *Arthashastra* discusses workforce management, including training, remuneration, and labour rights, which align with SDG 8’s emphasis on decent work. (Srinivasan & S, 2025)

**Economic Growth and Trade:** The text outlines strategies for market regulation, trade promotion, and resource allocation, reflecting sustainable economic growth principles.

**Governance and Institutional Frameworks:** *Arthashastra* promotes ethical governance and institutional mechanisms that ensure economic stability and social welfare.

### Integration of IKS and Arthashastra with SDG 8

Recent research explores how the philosophical and practical aspects of IKS, particularly those from Arthashastra, can inform contemporary economic policies aimed at achieving SDG 8 targets. Studies highlight:



### Methodology

This conceptual paper employs a systematic, interdisciplinary approach to bridge ancient Indian knowledge with contemporary sustainability discourse. The methodology involved a multi-stage process: (i) Textual Analysis of Arthashastra: Key economic, governance, and welfare principles were identified through a thematic analysis of Kautilya's Arthashastra. (ii) SDG 8 Deconstruction: SDG 8 targets were systematically analyzed to identify their core components related to sustainable economic growth, employment, and decent work. (iii) Conceptual Mapping: A rigorous mapping process was undertaken to align identified Arthashastra principles with specific SDG 8 targets, focusing on thematic congruence and potential for mutual reinforcement. (iv) Framework Synthesis: Drawing upon stakeholder theory, sustainable development theory, and ethical leadership theory, a conceptual framework was synthesized to illustrate the integration of Arthashastra-inspired principles into

modern sustainable business strategies. This approach ensures a structured and justifiable basis for the proposed alignments and framework." (Kanyamukenge & Kagwaini, 2024).

### **Limitations**

This conceptual paper, while proposing a novel framework, acknowledges several limitations. Its primary reliance on textual interpretation of the Arthashastra and conceptual alignment with SDG 8 means it does not offer empirical validation. The illustrative company examples are thematic alignments rather than direct evidence of Arthashastra's explicit adoption. Furthermore, the framework's practical implementation challenges and contextual nuances across diverse business environments are not explored in depth.

### **Future Research Directions**

Building on this conceptual foundation, future research should prioritize empirical validation of the proposed framework, testing its efficacy across various industries and emerging economies. Investigating the specific mechanisms through which Arthashastra principles can be operationalized within contemporary organizational structures, particularly concerning digital transformation and ESG integration, would also be invaluable.
